## A Pair of Wings

In 1903 the world watched as the Wright Brothers flew into history. . . marveling at this accomplishment was an unlikely spectator in Texas who was destined to make history of her own. Picking cotton at the young age of eleven, Bessie Coleman began to dream of a better future, as the Wright Brothers awakened in her a passion for flight.

At the beginning of the 20th Century, America was a nation in turmoil. A hopeful ferment of progressive social change was countered by a longstanding conservative impulse. In the South, the promises of Reconstruction had withered, to be replaced by Jim Crow laws that reintroduced pre-Emancipation oppression, lynchings, and hopelessness.

Arriving in Chicago in 1915, Coleman was in the first wave of African Americans to take part in the Great Migration, the largest movement of Blacks who fled the jobless agricultural South for the promise of work in the industrial North.

Although by 1920 American women had finally earned the right to vote, Coleman could find no one willing to teach her—a Black woman—to fly. Undaunted, she learned French and traveled by ship to France in pursuit of her dream. As the 20th Century dawns and Coleman comes of age, both aviation and the Great Migration continue to advance in parallel. From hardscrabble beginnings in Texas, Coleman's will and determination are strengthened in the new Chicago, and her aviation skills burnished by flight training abroad. She is ready. By pursuing her dream, Coleman seems to compel lines of longitude to bend and scribe new intersections, in a way that shifts the collective Meridian of an entire people.

A full century after her accomplishments, Coleman's story is brought to life by author Carole Hopson. A United Airlines pilot who flies the Boeing 737, Hopson, considers Bessie Coleman the pioneer who cut the path for her and believes that it is her job to continue Coleman's work to make that path wider for those who follow. It's Coleman's bold determination and courage that lifted Hopson, as well as an entire people upon A Pair of Wings.
